"Minerals of California"

We have a great lineup of symposium speakers to make this a memorable symposium:

Dan Evanich was born in Springfield, Illinois and grew up in Farmington, New Mexico during the early 1960's. Since the mid-60's, he has lived in San Jose, California. He has a Bachelor of Arts degree in Business Administration and, after more than 35 years in the consumer electronics industry, is now retired. He has been an avid field collector for the past 20 years, mostly in California, Nevada, Arizona and Utah. He is active in a number of organizations including the Bay Area Mineralogists, NCMA, MSSC, PNWFM and Crystal Gazers of San Francisco. His main collecting focus is the Western US, principally Butte, Montana and Tiger, Arizona.

Dan's talks will be Reward Mine and Champion Mine.

Rick Kennedy has been a mineral collector since he was eight years old, growing up in Ohio and then in the Bay Area of California. He has a BS in Earth Sciences from the University of California, Santa Cruz, and for years he specialized in minerals from San Benito County. Recently, he has become one of the partners at the Jackson's Crossroads Amethyst Mine in Georgia, Hallelujah Junction in Nevada, and the California Blue Mine in Southern California. He owns Earth's Treasures, a company that sells mineral specimens and rare faceted gemstones. He is currently a member of the Crystal Gazers, Bay Area Mineralogists, the Fluorescent Mineral Society, and the Santa Clara Valley Gem and Mineral Society.

and became a self-taught mineralogist. He enjoys his work in the consumer electronics and medical device industry and is currently a VP at Verb Surgical, a robotically-assisted surgical company. During the 1990's, John helped identify and publish articles on numerous mercury minerals from the Clear Creek Claim. His collection focuses on minerals from Japan, Korea, China and California, with sub-collections of Scheelite and rare, well-crystallized mineral species.

John will give two talks on Obscure but important California localities.

Scott Werschky earned his graduate degree from the University of Colorado, after which he worked as an exploration geologist for 16 years, prospecting for gold at sites from northern Alaska to southern Chile. He began collecting minerals during the mid-1990's and soon after founded Miner's Lunchbox, a company specializing in investment quality mineral specimens. His home base is Reno, close to the gold producing regions of California and Nevada. This, combined with his previous industry experience, has prompted him to focus on gold specimens in his business, making him one of the world's leading dealers in specimen gold.



INSTRUCTIONS FOR SATELLITE DEALERS

The 2018 Friends of Mineralogy Symposium and Show will again be held at the Red Lion Inn in Kelso, Washington. Kelso is located on I-5, a 45-minute drive north of Portland, Oregon. The Red Lion Inn is immediately east of and adjacent to I-5 at Exit 39.*

To become a Satellite Dealer, you must (i) reserve a room at the Red Lion inn, (ii) register for the Symposium, (iii) pay a dealer fee of \$25.00, and (iv) provide a mineral specimen for the FM Saturday night auction.

To register for the Symposium and pay the required satellite dealer fee (\$25), go to the Pacific Northwest Chapter website (www.pnwfm.org), where you will find registration instructions prominently displayed. Click on the link

https://squareup.com/store/pnwfm

and select either (i) the satellite dealer option or (ii) the Pine Room option.**

The deadline for registration is September 30. After that date, we cannot guarantee a sign tor your door or a listing in the posted directory of satellite dealers. We will collect your specimen for the auction on Friday night or Saturday morning. Your donation is important because we depend on the auction to keep the symposium in the black. For donation purposes, two or more dealers sharing a room will be considered as separate dealers.

Make your room reservation at the Red Lion Inn (360-636-4400) NOW because we expect all rooms to be filled. Be sure to tell the reservations clerk that you are with Friends of Mineralogy and that you want to be placed in the DEALER SECTION (North Wing rooms 168 to 191). All the rooms are generally the same. Each has two queen-sized beds, a refrigerator, several useful flat tables, and benches at the end of the beds for displaying minerals. The Red Lion Inn will not guarantee a specific room at registration, but be sure to state your preference and staff will honor your request at check-in if the room is available. Please tell me the number of the room you have requested when you register and, please, do not ask to change room assignments until you check in. I will get your actual room number from the Red Lion Inn staff on Friday afternoon before I put up room signs and prepare the final satellite dealer directory. Check-in time is 3:00 pm and while it may be possible to check in early if your room is ready, do not count on it. I will plan to arrive early on Friday afternoon, October 19, to provide assistance as necessary.

Except during Symposium presentations, satellite dealers are expected to be open on Friday from the completion of setup until 9:00 pm, on Saturday from 8:00 am to 9:00 pm. and on Sunday from 8:00 am until the show closes at 11:30 am. Set up promptly on Friday, and keep your doors open for business

and socializing. Friday and Saturday nights are the best times for selling. We all like to make money, but keep in mind that the most important thing about the Symposium is to **have a good time!**

The theme for this year's Symposium is **Minerals of California**. When I receive your registration form, I will confirm by sending you the Symposium program schedule and speaker list plus a flyer hat you can use for publicity (these are also available at www.pnwfm.org).

The format and layout for the Symposium and Show will be like that in previous years, with talks and dealer spaces in the same rooms as last year. A large room (the Show Room) that houses the floor dealers, displays, and registration table will be open to the public free of charge. This year's floor dealers are Lehigh Minerals (Jim & Yolanda McEwen), Pacific Rim Minerals (John Meek), Earth's Treasures (Rick Kennedy), and XTAL (Dennis Beals). All are returning from last year.

The following selection of photos are intended to demonstrate how the mineral kingdom can represent the colors of a season.








