PNWFM Minutes of Virtual Meeting

President, Toby Seim, called the meeting to order. Ten members were present. Toby wished all members good health.

Old Business:

The video tour of the PNW display at Whatcom Museum has been captured. Still on the agenda for the video are personal interviews.

Case repairs – We have six cases with various issues. Le Snelling volunteered to repair the cases. Bruce Kelley, treasurer, will order any parts needed. Karen and Gary Hinderman will coordinate with Bruce and Le to get this project completed.

New Business:

Symposium 2020 – Jessica Robertson, symposium chair, was introduced. She is a lifelong collector who is growing into a key player in the mineral world. Welcome Jessica.

We spent the majority of the meeting discussing options for our annual symposium. With the corona virus pandemic still a concern, we must think about the health of our members. Should we continue as usual, postpone, or have a virtual symposium?

After much discussion, a motion was made, seconded, and passed (10 yes, 0 opposed), to hold a virtual symposium Saturday, October 17, 2020, instead of a live symposium. The theme remains the same: *Aesthetic Minerals – Color & Crystallography*.

Julian Gray suggested we hire Bryan Swoboda, Blue Cap Productions, to videotape speakers and their power points. After each presentation, the speaker could host a live chat for questions.

Motion/seconded/passed to hire Bryan Swoboda to be our videographer for the 2020 virtual symposium.

We discussed having 3 – 5 talks. Ray Hill volunteered to be one of the speakers. The symposium committee will discuss the number of talks and speakers at a separate meeting.

Next, we discussed vendors. We discussed the Seattle Mineral Market's virtual show, how it was presented, and how it could be improved for our group. Discussion included having a set of rules for vendors to follow such as providing information about locality and specifics about each specimen (just like a great label). We also discussed limiting vendors to those involved in PNWFM. Motion/seconded/passed to work with Brittany Burkhardt and the rest of the symposium committee to come up with a viable plan for vendors to have a virtual show.

We discussed whether it was feasible to have a live auction. Symposium committee will need to discuss this further.

Finally, we had a discussion about fees. Should there be a fee for viewing the virtual symposium or should it be free? Motion/seconded/passed (one opposed) that you must be a current member of PNWFM to view the virtual symposium on October 17, 2020. This will include the Q & A with the speaker and the vendor show. The goal is for all members to pay their annual dues by October 17. We may also ask members for donations to help curb the costs of the videographer.

In other business, we discussed the annual camping clean-up project. Again, in order to protect the health of our members, we will cancel this event. Those wishing to gather may do so unofficially.

Good of the Order: Jessica has a zoom account which we can use in the future. The Rice NW Museum of Rocks & Minerals has a new interim curator, Angela Piller. We will need to reach out to her soon to continue our collaboration with the museum.

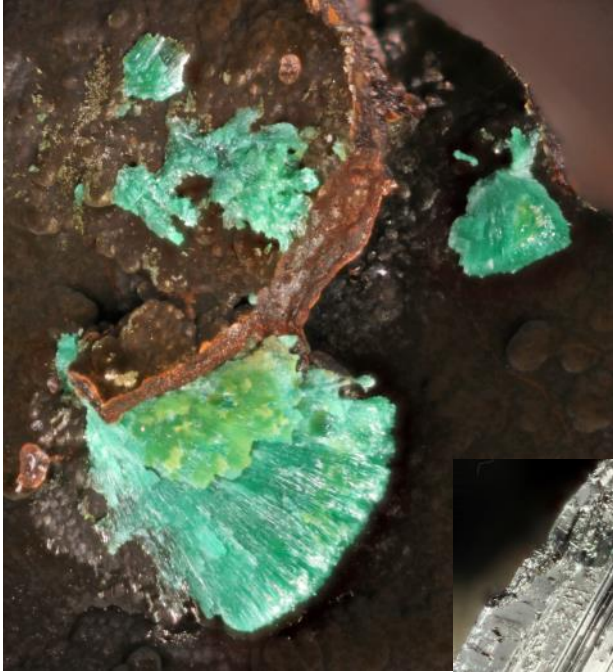

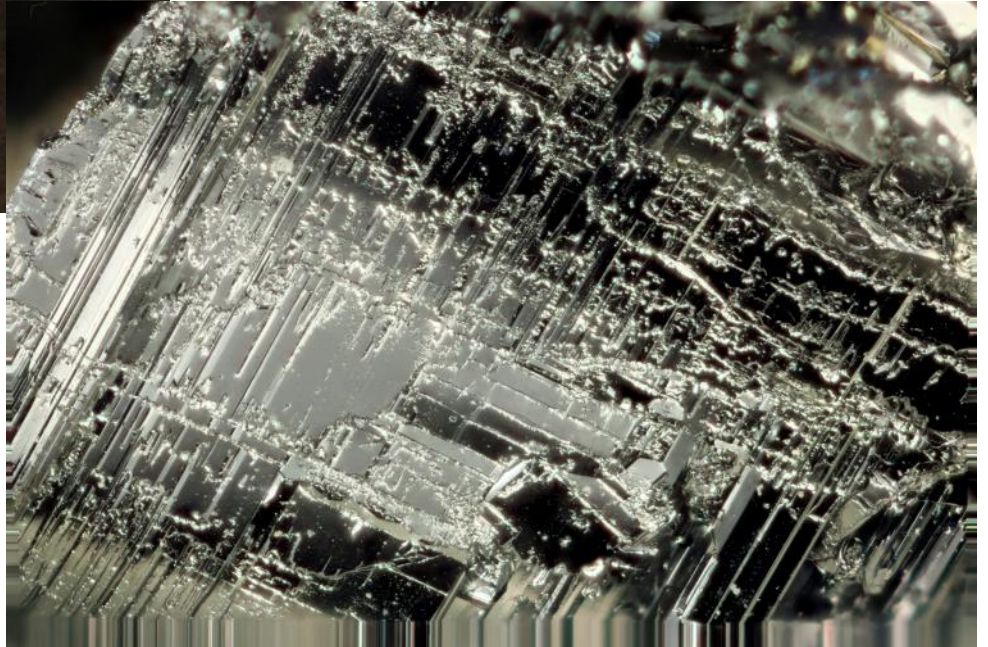

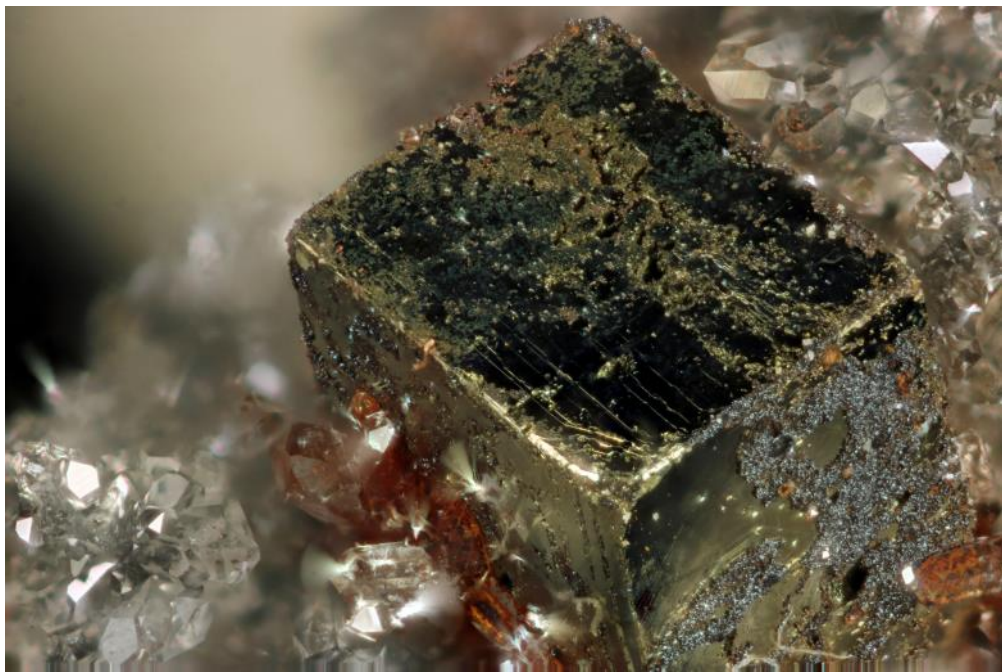
