Symposium Update

New Fees Charged at Crystal Park, Montana

As of August 1, 2002 a \$5 fee per car is being charged at the Crystal Park, collecting locality, west of Dillon, Montana. The fee is intended as a way to pay for maintenance work at the popular site. There is a self-service pay station located at the parking lot. Collectors are limited to collecting five days per year at the site and a five-day pass is available from the Forest Service office in Dillon, Montana for \$20. The five-day pass may be used on any days throughout the year.

Meeting Minutes July 21, 2002

Port Townsend, Washington

The summer meeting of the Pacific Northwest Chapter of Friends of Mineralogy (PNWFM) was held in conjunction with the annual conventions and show presented by the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies and hosted by the Northwest Federation of Mineralogical Societies. The event was held at the fairgrounds in Port Townsend, Washington, on Sunday, July 21st.

The meeting was called to order at 1:00 p.m. by President Jim Etzwiler. Jim welcomed all present and initiated self-introductions. At the opening of the meeting only 10 members were present and did not constitute a quorum.

It was announced that the Secretary has resigned for personal reasons and the vacancy will need to be filled. Sharleen Harvey volunteered to be acting secretary for the meeting. The minutes of the last general membership meeting were published.

Treasurer's Report. Treasurer Bill Dameron submitted the treasurer's report. He reported that the chapter membership has been reconciled with the National FM's membership list. He also reported that he is still checking with the IRS to determine the correct Federal ID number assigned to the PNWFM Chapter. There was a brief discussion of the advantages/disadvantages of becoming a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization. No decisions were made.

Symposium Report. Chair Aaron Wieting and Hotel Liaison Sharleen Harvey reported on changes in the rooms contracted with the Red Lion Hotel in Longview/Kelso. The main floor will be distributed between two rooms directly across the hall from each other with open double doors on each room. Registration will be in the hotel gallery just outside the entrance to our complex of rooms. Satellite dealers will begin in the north wing directly next to our main floor presentation. The banquet and benefit auction will be held Saturday night in the hotel's main dining room.

The 11th Annual Washington Pass Cleanup. John Cornish announced that the Klipchuck Campground camping area was reserved for August 9th – 11th and those interested should contact him.

National FM. Bill Dameron reported on national activities. A letter to mining

companies has been issued to encourage their help in preserving mineral specimens discovered during the mining process. Sharleen Harvey reported on the Werner Lieber Photo Contest and advised members that photos may be submitted in several different categories, including digital. Winners will appear in Rocks and Minerals. Members are also encouraged to enter educational exhibits in competition at the various shows. Jack and Kay Thompson (Denver FM Chapter) recipients of the education award for all three major shows and more, were present.

Jim Etzwiler announced that the 48th Annual Seattle Regional Show will be held at the Puyallup Fairgrounds on November 1 - 3.

There was no unfinished business.

New Business. A new Secretary is needed. John Cornish requested that the organization plan more activities, trips, meetings, visitations, etc. Jim Etzwiler reported that the Augite locality near Pe Ell needs clean-up. Discussion was held regarding undertaking the cleanup up, on DNR company property. It was suggested that October might be a good time to act on this. A date and permission from the property owner will be pursued.

Communications. Much discussion was held relative to a PNWFM website. Questions were expressed regarding maintenance, transitions, the need to be dynamic. The advantages of a website include getting word out quickly, a reflector website, utilizing email, etc. It was agreed that a communication route must remain open for all not yet using computers. The consensus suggested that the membership be queried as to interest and skills. Jim will check the Yahoo group sites.

The Noble Witt Award. Nominations were called for and Jim Etzwiler suggested anyone with a choice for nominee submit the name to any of the members of the Board of Directors.

Jack Thompson announced the Colorado FM Chapter Symposium preceding the Denver show on September 7-10, 2002. It was also announced that Cleveland will host the Midwest Chapter FM Micromount Symposium November 1-3, 2002.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

The 13th annual Washington Pass, Friends of Mineralogy Clean-up was held during the weekend of August 9th - 11th.

As in the past, we based out of Klipchuck Campground and worked in the Lone Fir Campground for the first time this year. The Forest Service was so impressed with our brush cleaning efforts at Klipchuck in 2000 that they chose Lone Fir to be this year's Clean-up focus. We pulled brush from beside the road making piles along the way as we progressed further into the campground. A dump truck was used by F.S. representatives to haul the debris away. Once we had the main cleaning done, we'd have to wait for the dump truck to return, this left ample time to explore the small boulder pile of fresh slide rock that they'd brought into the campground to use as boundary markers along the road and surrounding campsites. According to Dave Fallis, District Ranger for the Dillon Ranger District of the Beaverhead - Deerlodge National Forest, the fees will be used for such things as upkeep of the trails, campgrounds, and toilets. The Forest Service also intends to use some of the fees to eventually remove some of the overburden to expose fresh material to dig in. Removing overburden has become something of a safety issue since collectors must often remove significant amounts of overburden to reach fresh material.

There have also been some rumors that the Forest Service intends to adopt a policy of assigning digging areas for collectors at Crystal Park. According to Dave Fallis, there are no current plans to assign digging spots for collectors at this time. The Forest Service is evaluating how assigning diggings spots is working at a collecting locality near Helena, though this appears to be more of a fact-finding evaluation.

Cascade Siskiyou National Monument Public Comment Period Extended

The public comment period for the Cascade Siskiyou National Monument draft Management Plan (the Plan) has been extended to December 19, 2002. The Monument is located in Southwest Oregon along the California border and includes part of the volcanic Western Cascades of Oregon and the older Klamath-Siskiyou Terrane. The Plan is a voluminous document and the comment period was extended to allow the public additional time to thoroughly review it.

The Plan indicates that rockhounding occurred historically in the Monument in an area called "Agate Flat". Claims were once held on this area by local rockhounding clubs. Unfortunately, the claims were allowed to lapse prior to Monument designation. The Plan also includes information regarding moderate gold and silver potential in the northern portion of the Monument; however, as a National Monument, the area has been withdrawn from mineral entry. I also found references in my research indicating a few small skarns at the western end of the Monument.

Though rockhounding has occurred in the Monument in the past, there does not appear to be a discussion of its potential impacts in the descriptions of anticipated recreational uses in the Plan. It also does not state that rockhounding or collecting activities are specifically prohibited. The Plan indicates that recreational uses are secondary to overall priorities as a National Monument; however, recreational uses would be maintained at existing levels as of enactment of the Monument.

The draft Management Plan can be reviewed online at <http://www.or.blm.gov/csnm/>, though viewing the Plan requires Adobe Acrobat Reader 5.05 and downloading will be slow using a modem. It should also be noted that a few of the webpages have not been updated to reflect the extended comment period deadline of December 19, 2002.
